TIMELINE



1994

Father Jack Roussin, a collaborator of Partners In Health (PIH), selected young volunteers from Carabayllo to work on improving the living conditions of their community.



1996

Socios En Salud (SES) began treatment for the first group of eleven patients with multidrug-resistant tuberculosis (TB-MDR), under a community-based Directly Observed Therapy (DOT) model.



1999

SES achieved the highest cure rate (85%) in a cohort of 75 patients with TB-MDR, demonstrating to the world that it was possible to treat this disease in impoverished areas.



2004

SES implemented the first HIV and Sexual Health project with the support of 108 beneficiaries. In 2008, together with UNICEF, it expanded antiretroviral therapy for children, managing to identify about 1,000 affected individuals in vulnerable areas of Lima not captured by the health system.



2003

The Peruvian Government prioritized addressing the TB-MDR problem and coordinated with Socios En Salud to expand the program.

2001

Our team, led by Dr. Paul Farmer and other researchers from Harvard University, published new research articles on the impact of the first community-based TB-MDR treatment strategy in the world.



2005

The "Community First Aid Kits" project began, currently known as "Health Houses," to provide primary care to the communities of Carabayllo.



2008

The Carso Institute of Health, part of the Carlos Slim Foundation, recognized Socios En Salud with the 'Carso Award for Exceptional Institution' for our work in global public health.



2013

SES inaugurated the SES Lab, a tuberculosis research and development laboratory in Carabayllo district. This contributes to the development of new and better disease diagnosis methods.

Dear friends,

It is not easy to summarize in a few lines the impact that Socios En Salud has had on the most vulnerable communities in the past year. From research that replicates in public policies to the long paths traveled by a community health worker to monitor the well-being of our beneficiaries, the work we do is difficult to measure. But nothing is impossible.

Therefore, in the report we share below, covering the period from July 2022 to June 2023, we have made an effort to illustrate how, hand in hand with our virtuous cycle of care, we are able to bring the cure against injustice to more people. Promoting change while strengthening our health system.

Our Tuberculosis (TB) Program led to the Ministry of Health adopting new shortened oral regimens to treat this disease, thanks to the scientific evidence provided. Additionally, the HIV and STIs Program expanded its interventions in vulnerable populations, screening over 400 transgender women for HIV. The Non-Communicable Diseases Program also highlighted connecting 1,460 women with health centers for breast cancer detection.

Each program of Socios En Salud is backed by the inspiring stories of more than 200 community health workers. In the Maternal-Child and Adolescent Health Program, over 2,000 visits were made to ensure the success of the initiatives. Furthermore, the Mental Health Program achieved a 95% higher treatment adherence rate among people with schizophrenia, demonstrating the positive impact of continuous support.

During this year, we also extended our interventions with strategic allies. A notable example is the installation of solar panels in two districts of Ucayali, bringing energy and hope to priority communities. This report reflects not only numbers and statistics but also the real impact on the lives of many people, reaffirming our mission to make health an accessible right for all.

THEORY OF CHANGE

Care, training, influence through evidence, and replication. These are the four steps that make up our theory of change. None can exist without the other, interconnected like a network with the mission of bringing the cure against injustice to the most vulnerable communities.

This virtuous cycle of care begins with direct care, where each interaction with the patient becomes a seedbed of learning for a new generation of health professionals, who broaden horizons with clinical research.

Thus, from the findings, powerful evidence emerges capable of influencing global funding and policies through the replication of our work, necessary to strengthen the health system. Only with this work do we inspire governments to take measures that guarantee universal access to medical care.

Ultimately, this is the work of Socios En Salud: to create scalable impact that allows us to treat today's patients and build a future where suffering is not the norm.

health program SAMIA → It has been eight years since Socios En Salud launched the Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health Program (SAMIA) to strengthen first-level care services and ensure safe and responsible maternity for the well-being of early childhood and adolescence.

Since then, it has carried out projects whose impact has reached vulnerable families, thanks to the implementation of comprehensive maternal-child care strategies that promote healthy practices during pregnancy, childbirth, postpartum, and early childbood.

Additionally, it has provided psychosocial and educational support to its key population, thereby strengthening social fabric and contributing to women's empowerment in making health-related decisions for themselves and their children.

Maternal-child-adolescent health program Adolescents, a vulnerable group

In the last fiscal year, adolescents have been a population that Socios En Salud focused on in light of a concerning context, such as the 15% increase in new HIV cases over the last ten years, the rise in suicide rates between 2017 and 2021, and an increase in tuberculosis infections.

Therefore, SAMIA conducted a baseline study between January and June 2023 on the health situation of adolescents in the Carabayllo district and explored barriers to accessing health care for this age group. The research surveyed 464 adolescents and interviewed parents and health professionals. As a result, it was possible to identify the lack of knowledge of an exclusive health service, complications in obtaining an appointment, and the lack of medical personnel as the main barriers to accessing timely and quality health care.


These obstacles could maintain risk statistics in adolescence, bringing short- and long-term repercussions that can affect their comprehensive development. Therefore, we implemented the first differentiated consultation for adolescent care in a public first-level health center in North Lima.

Maternal-child-adolescent health program CASITA expands its coverage network

The community intervention in early childhood development, called CASITA, continued its activities, and in the last fiscal year expanded to two districts in Cusco, Maras and Capacmarca. **This initiative managed to identify 75 children aged 6 to 24 months at risk or with developmental delays**.

Among them is Ghael, a child under two years old who, after receiving his vaccination schedules and Growth and Development Controls (CRED) at the Jorge Lingán Health Post in Carabayllo, was enrolled by his mother in CASITA and attended 12 sessions at the community center on July 28 located in the mentioned district.

Cristina Núñez, one of the seven community agents trained this year in educational methodology, provided support to Ghael's mother to refer her child to the Los Olivos de Pro Rehabilitation Medicine Center, **where he received specialized attention in language therapies.** This was the first time such a referral occurred in the history of CASITA.

Maternal-child-adolescent health program

Healthier mothers, healthier children

Undoubtedly, the role of community health agents (ACS) is essential in our community care model. In SAMIA, **their work has been valued by the 54 pregnant women who received support between July 2022 and June 2023.** During this period, ACS carried out 279 prenatal home visits.

Furthermore, Socios En Salud accompanied 127 deliveries, provided psychoprophylaxis sessions to 76 pregnant women, and thanks to their management in treatment, managed to ensure that 89% of newborns, until the end of their gestation, arrived with a good weight.



Closer to our beneficiaries

2103 visits were made by community health agents in virtual or in-person modalities to beneficiaries or potential beneficiaries of SAMIA.

Partner Institutions

In its path to strengthen the health system, the Maternal-Child and Adolescent Health Program has allied institutions such as the Integrated Health Networks Directorate (Diris) of North Lima and the Regional Health Management of Cusco.

MENTAL HEALTH Program SAME Through our care model, in Socios En Salud we turn community experience into one of our pillars to strengthen the health system with timely, equitable, and quality medical care. This is demonstrated by the Mental Health Program (SAME) through various initiatives.

One of them focuses on strengthening the care system for people living with schizophrenia (PVE) who are treated in Community Mental Health Centers (CSMC) in North Lima. Thanks to our work, we achieved that 95% of monitored PVE adhered to their treatment.

This is the case of Gerson Monzón, who before starting his therapy at the Carabayllo Community Mental Health Center resisted taking his medication. This situation changed thanks to the intervention of one of the 25 community agents trained this year in monitoring people with chronic mental disorders and basic mental health skills.

Mental health program

With support from the community agent, Gerson received follow-up and accompaniment to the CSMC during his treatment. An improvement in treatment adherence allowed him to reintegrate into society by starting work as a vendor in a market and later accessing a scholarship. "It will help me grow as a person, succeed, and move forward," he told Socios En Salud.


Like him, 657 PVE received follow-up as part of the Continuity of Care and Rehabilitation Program (PCC-R), established by the Ministry of Health (MINSA). Additionally, SAME extended its intervention to two community health centers in the province of Trujillo, La Libertad.

The reach of SAME

146,377 people were sensitized through our campaigns

Mental health program **Fighting Depression and Anxiety**

The actions undertaken by SAME are transversal to the communities that the other Socios En Salud programs consider priorities due to their state of vulnerability. Thus, our initiatives to put a stop to depression and/or anxiety extend to people with HIV, tuberculosis (TB), women, infants, adolescents, migrants, among others.

Healthy Thinking (PENSA), in this sense, is one of the strategies that provides mental health care to pregnant women and postpartum women in the North Lima area.

After screening 127 pregnant women and finding that 36 of them presented symptoms of depression, in the last fiscal year, 30 mothers and their children successfully completed the 16 sessions that make up this intervention. To achieve this, it was necessary for four community health agents to provide support throughout this stage, after being trained through a virtual learning management platform and strengthened under the guidance of two psychologists during home visits to the pregnant women. The goal was singular: to reduce maternal depression and contribute to strengthening the mother-child relationship, specifically during the perinatal period.

The experiences from this intervention have been transferred to the Ministry of Health's Mental Health Directorate, and to date, the Maternal Mental Health Program has been implemented, which includes the Healthy Thinking strategy. Currently, the National School of Public Health (ENSAP) already has the online curriculum and is beginning training for staff in health establishments.

Mental health program

Intervening in Communities Affected by TB

In the last fiscal year, SAME also aimed to provide emotional support and promote strategies that favor treatment adherence for people affected by TB. **Thus, it deployed its actions in the Carabayllo district and surrounding areas,** where a care pathway was established to assess depression and anxiety in people affected by TB and their families (contacts).

The program screened 243 people, managed to conclude interventions for 166 cases, and provided psychological first aid to 33.

Additionally, 61 beneficiaries, with indicators of having suffered some form of past violence, underwent the PCL-5 questionnaire, which evaluates symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder.

In parallel, SAME evaluated the pulmonary and psychosocial sequelae of TB in young people who had overcome the disease. **Among the 68** adolescents identified, 63 were screened, divided into two groups: 28 with a history of TB and 35 without.

This initiative not only identified problems but also offered a pathway for care and intervention. **Thus, 33 adolescents were attended to with interventions in depression and anxiety and managed to complete them.**

TUBERCULOSIS (TB)

Program

Scaling at Socios En Salud is crucial because it amplifies the impact of its interventions at the national level by working closely with public policies. This strategy allows for the replication of innovations and best practices on a larger scale, benefiting more vulnerable communities.

In April 2023, part of our TB-focused

work—**research and clinical trials that provided scientific evidence for developing new interventions**—served as input for the update of the new Technical Health Standard for Comprehensive Care of Persons Affected by Tuberculosis, Family and Community, issued by MINSA, which repealed the previous 2013 technical standard.

Photo by Melquiades Huauya / SES This new technical standard implements key actions: rapid molecular tests for diagnosis, shortened oral treatments for TB-MDR, procurement of medications such as bedaquiline and rifapentine, reduction in time to start treatment for resistant TB, a rehabilitation section for pulmonary sequelae, and directly observed treatment through a community network.

These measures, aligned with international standards, significantly improve care, promoting early detection, effective treatment, and adequate rehabilitation. **Thus, the health system is strengthened, and access to quality medical services is expanded.**

Tuberculosis program Search, Treat, and Prevent Tuberculosis

Throughout this fiscal year, the TB Program implemented "TB Elimination," an integrated strategy to contribute to the eradication of this disease in our country. The initiative developed in key areas such as Carabayllo and Metropolitan Lima focused on three fundamental pillars: searching, treating, and preventing.

To effectively detect TB, active search activities were conducted in the general community and vulnerable populations. **Using an advanced diagnostic algorithm and state-of-the-art technological tools,** such as portable X-rays and molecular tests, TB cases that might otherwise have gone undetected were identified.

In addition, the "Mobile TB" initiative performed 15,892 X-rays and collected 3,752 sputum samples, diagnosing 446 TB cases and directing treatment for 334 of these cases. Meanwhile, the 'TB Backpack' conducted 3,734 X-rays, collected 940 sputum samples, diagnosed 40 TB cases, and referred 34 people for treatment. These active search strategies are essential to closing detection gaps for TB, especially among the hardest - to - reach groups.

Tuberculosis program

Once TB cases were identified, the focus shifted to comprehensive, rapid, and effective treatment. Our goal was to ensure that affected individuals received the best possible care, prioritizing those in highly vulnerable groups. The strategy included community-based directly observed treatment, with the support of community health agents to ensure that patients properly followed their therapeutic regimen. Close monitoring of patients was crucial to ensuring treatment adherence. As part of "TB Elimination," 925 follow-up visits were conducted, allowing 59 patients to successfully complete their treatment. This continuous support not only helped patients recover but also prevented the spread of the disease.

Tuberculosis program **Transforming Lives and Addressing Sequelae**

One of the program's top priorities was to ensure that patients diagnosed with TB received and completed their treatment effectively. **Thanks to a rigorous approach and constant support, 87% of patients, or 1,045 people, successfully completed their treatment.** This rate is due to the strategies implemented to provide support to patients at every stage of their treatment.

Additionally, it was achieved that 99.6% of people diagnosed with TB started their treatment, a high rate reflecting the program's commitment to community health. However, keeping patients in treatment until completion is a challenge. Despite these efforts, 11% of patients abandoned treatment, underscoring the need to continue strengthening adherence and continuous support strategies.

On the other hand, TB can leave significant sequelae even after healing. Therefore, the program also placed strong emphasis on evaluating and treating these long-term consequences. **During the year, 289 people were** screened specifically to evaluate the sequelae of TB. Of these, 83 underwent detailed medical evaluations by specialists.

Tuberculosis program

The results of these studies revealed that 60% of evaluated patients presented TB sequelae. These may include chronic respiratory problems and other health complications that require ongoing care. However, 16% of evaluated patients managed to improve their pulmonary function with respiratory physiotherapy and specialized medical treatment.

Advancements of the 'Proyecto País'

As part of the Country Project TB/HIV 2022-2025, funded by the Global Fund, the Tacna department acquired a mobile X-ray machine and a GeneXpert machine for TB care and prevention.

Moreover, it implemented a shortened oral treatment in four individuals with MDR-TB, and provided economic support to seven patients to cover transport, diagnostics, supplies, and medical procedures.

Additionally, in coordination with the National Multisectoral Health Coordinator and MINSA, and executed by Socios En Salud, in February 2023, work began on implementing the first shelter in Peru for individuals diagnosed with XDR-TB in situations of social and economic abandonment.

This shelter, managed by the Integrated Health Networks Directorate of North Lima (DIRIS Lima Norte), guarantees the care and adherence to treatment of individuals with XDR-TB, as well as reducing community transmission of the disease.



HIV and STIs Program HEALTH WITHOUT STIGMAS → Nearly 20 years ago, Socios En Salud successfully launched the HIV and Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) Program, marking an important milestone in its commitment to public health. Since then, it has dedicated itself to providing equitable access to prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of these conditions in underserved communities. Among these vulnerable groups are migrants, especially of Venezuelan nationality, whose adult population living in Lima, Callao, and Trujillo was the subject of interventions by Socios En Salud. Together with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the International Organization for Migration, we conducted a survey to provide estimates on the prevalence of HIV and syphilis in this population.

HIV and STIs program

Thus, it was found that the prevalence of HIV and syphilis in the migrant population was 1.01% and 0.94%, respectively, higher than that reported in the Peruvian adult population (ages 18 to 49).

These and other findings are essential for planning, implementing, and accessing health services and supporting local efforts for HIV and syphilis surveillance, ensuring that evidence is used to develop programs and inform policy decisions regarding these diseases for Venezuelans living in Peru.





HIV and STIs program Comprehensive Health Care for Transgender People

In Peru, the Ombudsman estimates that around 62.2% of transgender women engage in sex work due to a lack of employment. One of them is Alexia, who, until December 2022, before meeting Socios En Salud, did not know she was living with HIV and TB.

Discrimination and systematic violence against transgender women is not only reflected in the scarce opportunities they have to find formal employment but also in the limited access to basic health services. Many refuse to visit health establishments for fear of being discriminated against, distancing them from the opportunity to detect and treat various medical and mental health conditions. Additionally, access to gender affirmation therapy is limited through the State. It was through the community intervention "JunTrans" of the HIV and STIs Program that Alexia was able to learn about her diagnosis and later start her antiretroviral treatment and resume her TB therapy after receiving support.

Like her, between July 2022 and March 2023, **407** transgender women were screened for the timely and free detection of HIV, while 443 for TB, through urban mobile brigades and home campaigns for transgender women and recreational places throughout Metropolitan Lima.





HIV and STIs program

A crucial step in our JunTrans initiative was to link transgender women who tested positive for HIV with the Centers for Reference for Sexually Transmitted Infections and HIV/AIDS (CERITSS) at the first level of care to start antiretroviral treatment (ART); in the case of participants with tuberculosis, linkage was made to health centers in their jurisdictions to receive anti-TB treatment.

NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

Program ENT



\rightarrow To address chronic diseases in vulnerable

communities, the Non-Communicable Diseases Program (ENT) carried out a baseline study mapping the disease burden in the jurisdictions of the Health Houses of North Lima. This research not only provided a clear picture of health needs but also highlighted gaps and opportunities for future interventions. The intervention reached 896 families, with an average of 4-5 members per household. **Among them, it was discovered that 9% had at least one member with some type of disability, of which 64% were not registered** with the National Council for the Integration of Persons with Disabilities (CONADIS), remaining outside government assistance systems.

Non-communicable diseases program

Additionally, **118 people were identified** with diabetes and 109 with hypertension, of which 28% attend Health Houses for complementary care.

These findings underscore the need to strengthen social cohesion between the community and the health system. In the coming years, the reach of Health Houses could be expanded through comprehensive campaigns that include active searches for people having difficulty accessing the health system, in order to improve the detection and treatment of chronic diseases and ensure that more people with disabilities receive the necessary support.

With a strategy focused on inclusion and access, Socios En Salud can continue to transform primary health care and create healthier and more resilient communities.

Non-communicable diseases program

A timely exam, a life ahead

Active search is crucial in the prevention of non-communicable diseases (ENT) to facilitate early detection, reduce morbidity and mortality, promote healthy lifestyles, and improve access to treatment and follow-up.

Therefore, we undertook active search strategies, using all available resources. In this fiscal year, we aimed to contribute to reducing the incidence and mortality rate of breast cancer in women aged 50 to 69 residing in North Lima, aligned with the global initiative promoted by the World Health Organization (WHO).

Considering that every year more than 6,000 women in Peru are diagnosed with breast

cancer, the ENT Program, through a community intervention, screened 701 women. Furthermore, it performed 645 mammograms and 341 ultrasounds for the detection of this disease.

On the other hand, the detection of cervical cancer was also one of the key tasks for the program between July 2022 and June 2023. Together with the strategy for the Prevention and Control of Cancer of DIRIS Lima Norte and East, we launched a community strategy that provided free orientation campaigns. In this way, we managed to educate and guide 2,144 women on cervical cancer, 93% of whom had never undergone a molecular HPV test. Additionally, 1,460 women were connected with health centers to undergo this examination, of which 215 were positive.

Contributions that make a difference



→ An important piece in each initiative of Socios En Salud is the Social Protection Program (PPS), as its activities cut across all programs due to the social management support it provides.

Through its actions, **PPS seeks to mitigate the social determinants surrounding patient care, attention, treatment**, and healing through socio-economic support, access to education, food, and State services. Thus, PPS provided social support to 544 people. In parallel, it did the same for 51 beneficiaries of the ENT Program, 303 from the SAME Program, 101 from the SAMIA Program, 183 from the TB Program, and 189 from the HIV and STIs Program.

Protection social program

New opportunities for our beneficiaries

An initiative that highlights the reach of PPS is the kiosk for people living with schizophrenia (PVE) launched in May 2023. In coordination with the Carabayllo Community Mental Health Center, an employability plan was worked out so that PVE could have an opportunity to reintegrate into society through work.

A total of 10 PVE, who have skills for fast food, pastry, or crafts, were selected to undergo three workshops in managing small businesses along with their caregivers. The top four were placed in the kiosk located in the CSMC Carabayllo, where they sell hamburgers, coffee, snacks, cakes, among other products.

Every two weeks, they received strengthening through training on cash flow, monitored by a psychology professional from the same health establishment.

SOCIOS EN SALUD POLYCLINIC

In February 2023, the Socios En Salud Polyclinic (formerly the Oscar Romero Medical Center), specialized in respiratory and infectious diseases, through a Cooperation Agreement with the Ministry of Health of Peru, became the only private health center in the country authorized to treat tuberculosis (TB).

Marco Tovar, Director of Health Services at SES, mentions: "A milestone has been marked in the management of tuberculosis in the country. Now we can provide a choice of integral, timely, and quality health."

It is worth mentioning that, at the end of 2021, as part of the strategic alliances between public and private health systems, the SES Polyclinic became one of the authorized TAR centers by the Ministry of Health in East Lima to provide antiretroviral treatment to people living with HIV, in order to improve timely health care.

From our comprehensive and humane approach, we are committed to the well-being of our patients, providing them specialized care in a safe and stigma-free environment.

Breaking barriers to access to knowledge

Three years after its launch, the Global Health Center (CSG) has become an emblematic initiative of Socios En Salud. A beacon of knowledge in the field of global health that seeks academic excellence and is dedicated to breaking down the barriers that impede equitable health education access.

Focusing on strengthening the skills of health personnel at the national and international level, the CSG has to date reached over 28,000 users through its various actions. In the last fiscal year, its courses were attended by 2,440 people, while its training sessions reached 1,566.

In parallel, through the Training Unit, the various programs and units of Socios En Salud trained 14,418 people between June 2022 and July 2023, including teachers, community agents, collaborators, health professionals, and community-based organizations.

During this period, health global bootcamps were also held. A total of 50 people from different nationalities —university students, health personnel, and OnePIH members— participated in three intensive/immersive courses taught by global health professionals over a minimum of five days.



RESEARCH IN GLOBAL HEALTH

For Socios En Salud, the spark of innovation and the passion for scientific research are at the heart of our journey toward new forms of medical care that impact society. We focus on finding life-changing solutions backed by solid evidence and a deep understanding of the needs of our communities.

This past fiscal year, based on our close relationship with the communities we serve, **we conducted 33 health research studies.** Each study is a piece of the puzzle that helps us formulate new knowledge and solutions for public health challenges.

Some studies have shown potential for scaling up. For example, **one demonstrated how community accompaniment is effective in facilitating the transition of adolescents to adult HIV care.** Another study highlighted the importance of using digital technology to implement a psychological support response for populations affected by the pandemic.

Pharmacy

→ Ten years after its inauguration, the Pharmacy of Socios En Salud has shown consolidation through its milestones, based on its two essential pillars: clinical pharmacy and research pharmacy. Both ensure the timely access to pharmaceutical products and medical devices for our communities.

In the last fiscal year, it acquired new drugs for tuberculosis treatment—such as linezolid, clofazimine, and delamanid—**and donated over 30,000 medications to various healthcare entities,** including the National Center for Strategic Resource Supply (Cenares) of the Ministry of Health, Essalud, and the National Hospital Hipólito Unanue, among others.

Furthermore, through the pharmacies of the Socios En Salud Polyclinic and the Carabayllo headquarters of Socios En Salud, new medications (levofloxacin tablets) for preventive treatment of MDR-TB in children were introduced, and the acquisition and donation of tocilizumab to the Regional Hospital of Trujillo for the therapy of patients affected by juvenile rheumatoid arthritis was managed. On the research front, the Pharmacy Unit approved various storage and dispensing units for research products and related items for use in clinical trials at the Socios En Salud Polyclinic and the RCI research centers of the National Hospital Hipólito Unanue and the National Hospital Sergio Bernales.

Ethics Committee

\rightarrow In line with national regulations

established by the National Institute of Health (INS) of Peru, as well as the international guidelines of the World Health Organization (WHO), the Research Ethics Committee (CIEI) of Socios En Salud seeks to protect the rights, well-being, and safety of research participants.



Comprising 12 members (qualified professionals and recognized members of civil society) and a technical secretariat, the CIEI held 24 sessions between July 2022 and June 2023. Since its creation, it has reviewed 43 protocols, both quantitative and qualitative, in areas related to TB, HIV, mental health, community health, chronic diseases, maternal and child health, and others.

Among its milestones, in June 2023, the CIEI was accredited by the General Office of Research and Transparency of the National Institute of Health of Peru, thus ensuring compliance with national and international ethical standards. Additionally, in December 2022, it updated its regulatory documents to comply with regulations for the protection of national research subjects.

Other notable activities include the follow-up of approved protocols and the training of CIEI members through a research ethics course on human subjects, provided by the Universidad Peruana Cayetano Heredia.



Replication

Ensuring that every person has access to dignified healthcare is one of our strongest purposes.



We achieve this by sharing our approach with national governments, inspiring them to replicate it in public health policies that prioritize the care of the most vulnerable populations.

In this mission, we work hand in hand with the Ministry of Health of Peru, **creating reliable medical delivery systems and demonstrating that quality healthcare is not only a universal right but also a moral issue.** We firmly believe that social justice and equity are fundamental pillars to achieving this essential goal.

Replication

Almost 500 kilometers from Lima, in the Ucayali region, lies the district of Masisea, home to more than 12,800 people from 87

native communities. They have a healthcare facility whose access to electricity was irregular due to poorly functioning or unstable generators.

To address this situation and strengthen the first level of healthcare to close existing gaps, Socios En Salud visited this population to implement a photovoltaic electricity generation system at the Masisea Health Center.

With an investment of approximately \$62,000, 44 solar panels with a capacity of 20 kW were installed, converting solar energy into electrical energy to improve the power supply for oxygen concentrators used in treating patients with respiratory diseases. By

A commitment to renewable energy

To date, Socios En Salud has implemented solar panels in five health centers: Ciudad de Dios Health Facility; Ciudad de Dios Health Facility (Arequipa); Maras Health Facility (Cusco); Capacmarca Health Facility (Cusco); Masisea Health Center (Ucayali); Iparia Health Center (Ucayali). April 2023, around 1,200 people directly benefited from this service. The solar panels have been key to providing electricity to the entire health center, including areas such as obstetrics, dentistry, psychology, emergencies, and patient observation.

Replication **ADVOCACY**

In the last fiscal year, the Advocacy and Community Engagement Unit of Socios En Salud empowered communities through training and education on local health issues.

Along with civil society organizations working on TB, **they carried out activities to prioritize the strengthening of technical and organizational capacities to enhance** their participation in planning processes and decision-making spaces. In this regard, through the ENTRENA TB – LAC initiative, implemented by Socios En Salud in **Paraguay**, **Colombia, and Peru,** the course "Specialization in Addressing Vulnerable Populations, Legal Context Analysis, Gender Impact, and Stigma in TB Care" was developed.



Replication - Advocacy

The 12-week course, with synchronous and asynchronous work, **involved 60 community leaders and civil society representatives from Latin America and the Caribbean**. Some graduates developed political advocacy plans based on identifying and prioritizing needs according to the specific problems of each country.

Additionally, the INCIDE TB – LAC initiative supported the development of 12 political advocacy plans proposed by civil society to highlight specific TB-related issues and propose advocacy actions in **Peru, Colombia, Bolivia, Guatemala, El Salvador, Mexico, the Dominican Republic, Panama, Paraguay, Honduras, Chile,** **and Argentina.** Through mini-grants, these plans were implemented between August and December 2022. Topics included migrant populations, vulnerable populations and social protection, promotion of TB law, human rights, legal services, and research.

At the conclusion of these plans, the "Regional Summit on Political Advocacy to Improve Access to TB Health Services in Latin America and the Caribbean" was held from December 7-9, 2022, in Cartagena, Colombia. During this event, a "Call to Action Document to Transform the Response to Tuberculosis in the Americas" was proposed and published, aimed at heads of state, the international community, and donors.

Replication

Community Advisory Committee (CAC)

The Community Advisory Committee (CAC) celebrated ten years, committed to the well-being of society. The committee, consisting of nine members (including professionals and community leaders), and affiliated with the Global Community Advisory Board of the ACTG Network*, seeks to improve the timeliness and impact of Socios En Salud's projects for the benefit of the community. The committee provides insights into community needs, specific vulnerabilities, and cultural patterns.

It also offers suggestions to optimize implementation strategies in the field and direct user care, ensuring their adaptation to the community context, participation mechanisms, continuous feedback, and opportunities for sustainability.

In April 2023, the **CAC celebrated its tenth** anniversary with a training activity, a visit to the research site of the Sergio Bernales Hospital, and to the Pharmacy and Laboratory areas of our Chimpu Ocllo headquarters. Through this, committee members were able to gain a deeper understanding of the institution's work in the implementation of clinical trials, better understand the work dynamic, recruitment and retention strategies that could be applied to the review of Socios En Salud projects and ACTG Network protocols.

Between July 2022 and June 2023, the CAC reviewed and approved 28 Socios En Salud projects whose field implementation strategies received feedback from the community's perspective and were considered appropriate for the local context.

Replication SES ENGAGE

The Socios En Salud Engage Peru network (also known as SES Engage Peru) celebrated its first National SES Engage Congress in May 2023, which brought together university leaders from four Peruvian universities to provide them with technical resources, knowledge, and experiences to design innovative campaigns in favor of health equity in Peru.

Over two days, SES Engage representatives in Peru participated in dialogues and learning spaces through workshops and theoretical plenaries with international specialists from Partners In Health (USA), Compañeros en Salud (Mexico), academic authorities, and national representatives of various Socios En Salud programs.

Throughout the fiscal year, SES Engage members participated in 125 coaching sessions, 7 educational initiatives, and 3 advocacy projects.

This network is made up of more than 90 members from the Voluntary Brigade of Health Agents (BVAS) at the Universidad Peruana Cayetano Heredia (UPCH), Universidad Continental, Universidad Nacional Mayor de San Marcos (UNMSM), and Instituto Carrión.





VALUE ADDED

Throughout its history, Socios En Salud has followed a path guided by the values of accompaniment that we deeply appreciate. For this reason, we know that diseases are fought not only with medicine but also with care and social support for each patient, their caregivers, and their families.

To turn health into a universal right and stay ahead in the fight against diseases, we need more than just medication. It is through community intervention that hope is restored to communities.





Accompaniment

Community health workers are unsung heroes who play an essential role in primary health care.



Their voluntary work in promoting health and preventing diseases is the bridge Socios En Salud needs to reach more communities.

From July 2022 to June 2023, a total of 229 community health workers were active. Notably, 15 of them participated in two projects simultaneously, and one was involved in three initiatives at the same time, demonstrating truly inspiring commitment and dedication.

For example, the TB Program had 97 community health workers, while the Mental Health Program had 61, the Non-Communicable Diseases Program had 28, and the Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health Program had 31.

Through their hard work, these agents advance our mission to achieve health for all. They remind us daily that the true strength of a community lies in mutual support and working together for a healthier and more equitable future.

SES SCHOLARSHIP

In October 2022, the third round of the Academic Excellence Scholarships, also known as SES Scholarship, began. These scholarships offer technical training to community health workers from Socios En Salud.

Out of a total of 319 applicants, six community health workers from Ica, Loreto, Junín, Ayacucho, Apurímac, and Áncash were awarded the SES Scholarship. Their studies will conclude in 2025.




BUDGET ALLOCATION

★ BY PROGRAMS 2022-2023


